




The Bureau of Indian Education Homeless Program initiated a partnership with The University of New Mexico's Native American Studies program. "NTVE 461: Community-Based Learning in Indigenous Contexts" course where students assisted the BIE State Coordinator in developing training modules for McKinney-Vento youth in high school and their parents about accessing and maneuvering the postsecondary education system.


