




### Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity









#### Graduation Rate by Race/Ethnicity







#### **English Language Arts Participation**





#### English Language Arts Proficiency - All Students






#### English Language Arts Proficiencies by Other Characteristics





#### **Mathematics Participation**





#### Mathematics Proficiency - All Students









#### Science Participation





#### Science Proficiency - All Students






### Science Proficiencies by Other Characteristics



#### **English Learner Progress**







Early Career Educators: Educators with four or less years of experience.

An **Emergency Certificate** is issued to an educator who holds, or is eligible to hold, a teaching license but has not met the requirements for certification in a specific content area. An emergency certificate is issued only at the request of the hiring authority (e.g. school district). Emergency certificates are valid for up to three years (or up to six years in the case of skilled and technical science teachers) unless revoked. Emergency certificates are not issued for all content areas.

**Out-of-field teachers** taught at least one course outside their licensed content area. While teachers holding an emergency certificate or certificate of eligibility are identified as teaching out-of-field in this analysis, these licensed educators are working towards full certification in the appropriate content areas.
